Questions from the Sermon <u>December 13, 2020</u>

- 1. Which Christmas Carol do you enjoy the most each Christmas? Why? (Sorry, you can only pick one, or in some cases, you have to pick one..)
- 2. What Christmas present do you remember receiving growing up?
 -What made it so memorable?

Memories are often a wonderful part of Christmas. They remind us of 'home', and times and people that are important to us.

Read Luke 15:11-24

- 3. Put yourself in the younger son's shoes (sandals). What do you think you would be feeling and thinking as you got closer and closer to home?
 - -Why do you think the younger son would have been apprehensive and maybe a bit fearful? What often causes us to feel this way?
- 4. Try and imagine you are the Father in this story. What do you think you would be feeling when you saw your son a distance off? (try to be honest)
 - -What do we parents often think is the most important thing we need to do when our kids have disobeyed or done something that has disappointed us?
 - -Does reading about this Father's response change your thinking about what is most important?
- 5. Knowing that 'running' was seen as such a degrading and unacceptable action for a dignified Jewish man at that time, why do you think the Father chose to run anyway?
 - -How do you think this would have made the son feel seeing his Father running toward him? What do you think he would have expected was the reason?
- 6. What message do you think the Father was trying to make to his younger son?
- 7. Doesn't the Father's decision to have a party seem a bit over the top? Why do you think Jesus made that part of the story?
- 8. If you were sitting in the audience that day, listening to Jesus tell this story, what ending would you have expected when the son came home?
 - -How do you think this ending made the Notorious sinners and tax collectors feel?
 - -How do you think this ending made the Pharisees feel?

- 9. Why does this ending of the younger son's return seem so unjust and unacceptable to us?
- 10. What other examples can you think of that make us feel like God's response to us is unfair and unjust?

Read Hebrews 4:14-17

- 11. What does the Writer of Hebrews mean when he says in verse 14...
 - ".. who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession."?
 - -Why is this statement so important about Jesus?
- 12. How important is it to us that Jesus can 'sympathize' with us?
 - -How do we see this showing up in the story of the younger son in Luke 15?
- 13. How does this allow us to "Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace.."?
